What is safeguarding?

Safeguarding and promoting the welfare of children is defined for the purposes of KCSiE, 2025 as:

- protecting children from maltreatment;
- preventing impairment of children's mental and physical health or development;
- ensuring that children grow up in circumstances consistent with the provision of safe and effective care; and
- taking action to enable all children to have the best outcomes

What do I need to do?

confidentiality.




KNOW HOW

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Staff Behaviour
